Overview of Camp Model

Setting

- Located on the UCSB Campus
- Approximately 200 typically developing children attend camp each week
- 8:30 a.m. – 4:15 p.m., Monday - Friday
- Children are grouped according to age
- 10 - 15 children in each group

Support Staff

- Bob Koegel, Ph.D. and Lynn Koegel, Ph.D.,
- Supervisors: Danny Openden, Ph.D. and Ty Vernon
- In – home parent education clinicians
- 1 : 1 Aides: graduate and undergraduate students trained in PRT intervention and social facilitation strategies

Campers

- Approximately 50 children with autism
- Age range: 4 ½ – 13
- Each child attended camp for 2 weeks

Activities

- Gymnastics, swimming, art, field games, music, ropes course, computers, board games, dance, and science



Why Summer Camp is Important

- Provides on-going intervention in summer months
- Promotes acquisition of new skills
- Opportunities to:
 - Develop friendships between children with ASD and their typically developing peers
 - Increase social interactions with typically developing peers
 - Enhance communication skills
 - Learn appropriate social behaviors

Main Objectives

1. Children with autism are included in all summer camp activities with modifications made where necessary

We found that all children with autism were able to increase the amount of time spent participating in the activities

2. Children with autism will have opportunities to interact with typically developing peers

We found that all children with autism were able to increase the number of expressive interactions with typical peers

3. Develop target goals to be implemented for the following school year

Using adolescents with aspergers or high functioning autism (HFA) as support facilitators for summer camp inclusion program
